## He was a brave man who knew the odds

A VILLAGE near Swindon mourned today as tributes mounted for murdered MP Airey Neave, who was assasinated yesterday.

For the war hero, Shadow Ulster Secretary and close adviser to Mrs Thatcher, was a loved and respected villager in downland Ashbury for most of his political career.

He left recently when his safety in the isolated village became a major security problem. But villagers remember him as the man always with time for local problems.

He was in Ashbury at the height of the IRA terror eampaigns, and strict security was a way of life for villagers when Mr Neave was at his weekend retreat.

His former gardener, 78-year-old Stan Halliday, said Mr Neave had never been alreed and had accepted the throats on his life.
