The crowd follows Mary and Joseph – and the donkey – around the village as the story unfolds before tucking into mince pies at the end.

"Ashbury is a village with a wonderful heritage and at this and other village events I am always touched at how the children that sat with me and my sisters on the hay bales 30 plus years ago, have also kept it part of their growing family's Christmas tradition by joining in every year," she said.
