

Thought for the month-August

We humans do a peculiar thing ... we spend more time, collectively, worrying about what might happen than we do appreciating what is happening. It seems to be in our nature to fear.

Since the "Brexit" vote, the news has been awash in dire predictions - about the economy, about possible legislative changes that might affect workers' rights, about the environment, about the possibility that the UK itself might break up.

News reports that promote fear, insecurity or suspicion aren't new - it's just the current list of "things to fear" that varies. The list will change again. It has always changed. And most of the things we waste our time worrying about never actually happen, and were never especially likely to happen. They just sold newspapers and attracted television viewers.

Trying to learn how to live in the present - trying to not worry about might happen tomorrow - is difficult. It's a bit like faith. Faith in anything, whether it is religion or an individual or a concept, is a challenge. Because in order to have faith, you must suspend the need for control - and we like to believe that we can at least control our own destinies.

The trouble is that complete control over your own destiny simply isn't possible. Events will occur that change all your plans. You might lose your job. Your house might burn down. You might win the lottery. You might make a new friend who changes your life.

Of course there's nothing wrong with making plans for the future: taking out insurance, making investments, maintaining your house, planning your next holiday. There's nothing wrong with carrying a jacket in case it rains. It's just that we should then go ahead and enjoy our days as they come, one at a time.

The Bible is, among other things, a social history. If we look at what was happening in the world more than two thousand years ago, if we try turning the language into a modern-day news report, we'll realise that, except for industry and technology, not a lot has changed. People still make war over differing ideologies. People still treat those who are different with fear, suspicion, or overt hostility. We are still tribal creatures - and perhaps we always will be.

Does that mean that all the important ideals we've tried to embrace and disseminate for the past two thousand years are wrong, or pointless?

I don't think so. I believe we just keep getting in our own way. The loud voices of fear and worry, anger and suspicion drown out the gentler tones of acceptance and trust.

Maybe we can evolve by learning how to live within the day we have, savouring the good, and accepting that we will get through the bad.

The world will change when we do.

A message from the new Bishop of Oxford to the clergy and people of the Diocese

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

Thank you for your various messages of welcome and for your prayers following the announcement of my nomination as the Bishop of Oxford. It's an enormous honour and privilege to be appointed to this role and I look forward very much to serving the communities of Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire in the coming years.

My Confirmation of Election as Bishop of Oxford will be held on 6th July. I am due to pay homage to Her Majesty the Queen later in July and resume my place in the House of Lords. I will continue to meet with the senior team in Oxford and plan for the autumn.

Ann and I hope to move to the new See House in Kidlington at the end of August and I will be working to a normal diary in the diocese from early September. My inauguration is set for Friday 30th September in the Cathedral. There will then be four Welcome Eucharists at which I will preside and preach, one for each Archdeaconry:

I would like to meet as many people as possible over the first few weeks in post so please put one of these dates in your diary and I look forward to seeing you there.

I hope to visit the parish clergy of the Oxford Area in October and November. I am also planning a series of Deanery Days from November to July to begin to get to know and to listen to the whole Diocese. During those visits I look forward to engaging with lay people and clergy and getting to know the wider community as well as the church. I also look forward to being out and about across the whole Diocese Sunday by Sunday.

You can discover something about me in advance from the Diocesan website, should you wish to do so. I was formed as a parish priest in Halifax. I was shaped as a

thinker and writer in Durham and through travelling the country as Archbishops' Missioner. I have been forged as a Bishop in Sheffield and South Yorkshire, seeking to recall the Church here and elsewhere to the mission of God.

I'm conscious I will have much to learn in my early years in Oxford. Please pray for me: for the gifts of humility, wisdom and gentleness for this new ministry. Pray in the words of the ordinal that my heart may daily be enlarged to love this great Diocese to which God has now called me.

I'm looking forward very much to working with Bishop Colin, Bishop Andrew and Bishop Alan in the coming years and with the rest of the senior team. I'm conscious that the Diocese owes a particular debt to Bishop Colin for his care and leadership during the long vacancy.

Based on the listening I have done so far, I will focus my ministry across the whole Diocese in three areas in the early years: on engagement with children, young people and young adults; on enabling lay discipleship in the world and on engaging with the poorest communities across the Diocese. These priorities are not a new Diocesan strategy. That may emerge over time. They are initial themes for my own engagement with the whole Diocese and I look forward to taking them forward with you.

I believe that the Christian faith and the Christian church will become ever more central in the life of our nation and the world in the 21st Century as people seek again for meaning, for values, for purpose and for hope.

God has called the Church to be a community of mercy and kindness, reflecting the nature of Jesus Christ and telling the good news of his love. Together we are called to be a community of missionary disciples: faithful, united, hopeful, creative and rejoicing in God's grace.

I look forward very much to meeting you, to knowing you and being known and to working with you,

Country Matters

Some of the best pubs are hidden away and want some finding. If we ever get some summer and you feel adventurous, a drive out one evening to any of these four could be rewarding and leave you with a sense of achievement if you are successful. My own experience is that many find difficulty in locating our local, the Royal Oak in Bishopstone, which unlike the four is actually in a village!

The Hatchet at Lower Chute south of Hungerford. The Tunnel House near Coate, Cirencester. The Harrow Inn at Steep, near Selbourne, north of Petersfield.

The Daneway Pub near Oakridge, west of Cirencester.

Most of these happen to be sited close to outstanding sites usually owned by the county wildlife trusts where rare butterflies and wild flowers may be seen. The Daneway banks, just up the road from the Daneway, is a site where the large blue butterfly was reintroduced in the 1980's after this species became extinct nationally in 1979. The reintroduction has worked and there are now nine active sites in the country for this blue butterfly with black markings on its upper wings. It flies in June and July but disappointingly it is only just a little bit bigger than the common blue which can be seen around here on our downs.

The large blue has a remarkable life cycle. Eggs are laid on the seed heads of wild thyme and at Daneway, wild marjoram, both prolific, and the larvae burrow into the seed heads. When they reach about 4 mm they drop to the ground and secrete a special honey gland which attracts red ants which take them below ground into their chambers. The Daneway site is covered with raised ant hills. Below ground the larvae feed on ant grubs and hibernate there before pupating in the spring, with the newly emerging adults crawling to the surface in late May before expanding their wings to fly in June. Despite three attempts this wretched summer my luck has been out but I have spoken to others who have seen a good many of this rare butterfly at the Daneway Banks.
