**Thought for the month: Letter from Canon Richard Hancock. TSSF
Blessed are....**

The Bishop of Oxford Rt. Rev'd. Dr Steven Croft has invited us all to go on a journey with him to explore the Beatitudes over the Advent period. Bishop Steven believes the teaching found in the Beatitudes, part of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount [Matthew 5.1-10] are key to living as a Christian disciple. In them we find the heart of the Christian faith and he has distilled these down to three headings, Contemplative, Compassionate and Courageous. His hope is that we can model ourselves, our communities and our churches on these principles.

As Advent is a time for reflection and contemplation, as we prepare for the great feast of Christmas, I invite you all to look at how we can be a more Contemplative church. Here is an excerpt from the Bishop's booklet on exploring the Beatitudes.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

According to the gospels, Jesus often withdrew to spend time apart with God (Mark 1.35; Luke 5.16). Jesus calls the twelve disciples to be with him before they are sent out (Mark 3.14). In the great image of the vine, Jesus calls his disciples to abide in him so that God's life may bear fruit in our lives.

To be a contemplative Church means:

To be deeply rooted in Christ as a branch in the vine, through prayer and worship, word and sacrament

To be sustained in joy and hope in the midst of a suffering world

To seek the continual grace and renewal of the Holy Spirit in our lives

To value deep wisdom and offer meaning

To take our theology seriously as dialogue with God as well as talk about God

To live in healthy rhythms of prayer and rest and work and be fully human

To be good news in an over active and busy world

To offer the gift of silence, still places and moments of encounter with the living God

To listen deeply to ourselves, to the world in which we live and to one another

To discern God's call to us as individuals and communities
 To wrestle with God
 To surrender our doing in order to make space for stillness and dwelling,
 that God might be free to do and act **within** us.

“Contemplation is the only ultimate answer to the unreal and insane world that our financial systems and our advertising culture and our chaotic and unexamined emotions encourage us to inhabit. To learn contemplative practice is to learn what we need so as to live truthfully and honestly and lovingly. It is a deeply revolutionary matter.” **Rowan Williams**

I would invite you all to reflect on these and what they mean for your own life as well as that of the church and local community.

Country Matters

This time of the year I am out and about covering a lot of country. In the past week I have been privileged to be asked to shoot standing in picturesque valleys in both the Cotswolds and Chilterns. I am usually accompanied by my black lady companion but my four-legged shadow is off games just now with eleven stiches in her chest and a lampshade round her head to deter licking the wound. This autumn the crops have emerged well, better than last year when slugs and flea beetle damage were more of a problem. Our cattle are now housed, tucking into silage but keeping them clean will not be so easy this year, with the bedding straw so brittle after the August storms that it breaks up too easily.

This year many French vineyards are harvesting one of the smallest yields of grapes on record but here we did not have those damaging frosts and in this season of mellow fruitfulness, fruit has been abundant. I am also struck this year by the brilliant vibrancy of our red berried shrubs. As someone who often starts the day with a well known brand of cereal with red berries for

breakfast, these fruits in our hedges and gardens really add colour to a dull December day. Many shrubs profit like apples from having both genders in proximity and we must teach our children that most colourful red berries are poisonous.

In our hedgerows fieldfares and redwings are clearing the hawthorn haws; beneath these bushes you can spot the vivid necklaces of bryony and woody nightshade. You will also find spindleberries. I have planted a good number in new hedges and they are one of my favourites, with the orange pip now breaking out. Unfortunately they play host to overwintering aphids. Also to be found is the guelder rose which is a variety of viburnum with red berries. I get a buzz near Christmas of harvesting plenty of berried holly on the downs from bushes I planted over twenty years ago. Growing up, we had none in the Vale but farming relations in west Dorset used to send us a box through the post and we used to reciprocate with a brace of pheasants posted unwrapped just with an addressed label round their neck! Those were the days, but seriously let me know if you would like to be given game in the feather and I will see to it. Whitebeam and Rowan trees also sport red fruits. And our gardens are now showing brightly with the vivid crimson varieties of cotoneaster and pyracantha, often as a hedge or against a wall.
