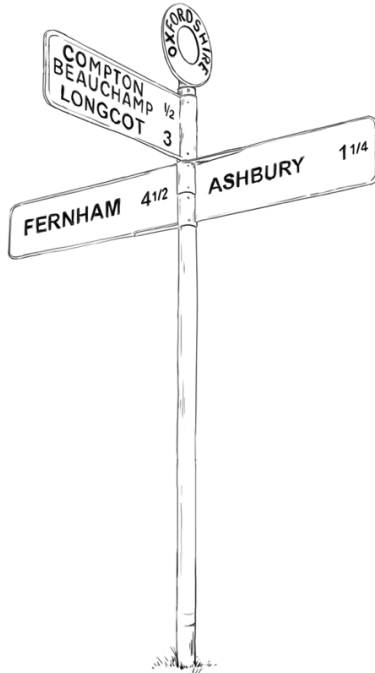

## Thought for the month

Four very different pieces of writing have struck me in the past few weeks. In a recent Sunday paper there were heart-rending pictures and accounts of children of militant fighters in Northern Syria, many of whom were orphans and described as “children whose Isis parents had chosen to starve them under the bombs in their caliphate’s final days rather than escape to safety.” The children were for the most part severely malnourished and their identities unknown; they could be French, Pakistani, Kyrgyz, Indonesian, British. Whatever our political or religious beliefs, the plight of these innocent children surely arouses in us anger, pity and helplessness, coupled as it is by daily news stories of other human tragedies such as Cyclone Idai. Most of us are not in a position to offer direct help in any of these situations although we can contribute through mechanisms such as the Disasters Emergency Committee or, in May, via Christian Aid Week.

Thanks to our wonderful library in the Kingston Winslow telephone kiosk I discovered some counterbalance to the daily stories of conflict and suffering in a novel by Ian McEwan, set on one day in February 2003 and titled “Saturday”. Assessing the gloomy world view which prevailed then, the young adult son of the main character expresses it thus: “when we go on about the big things, the political situation, global warming, world poverty, it all looks really terrible, with nothing getting better, nothing to look forward to. But when I think small, closer in – you know, a girl I’ve just met, or this song we’re going to do with Chas, or snowboarding next month, then it looks great. So this is going to be my motto – think small.”

This doesn’t mean I should stop reading the news, or giving to charity, or joining with others to pray about world situations, but we have so much around us, especially in spring, to be thankful for and enjoy. The opening lines of W.H. Davies’ poem “Leisure” are well known but I am also reminded of the closing lines:

“A poor life this if, full of care,  
We have no time to stand and stare”.

“Thinking small”, as the young man in “Saturday” advises, is not about ignoring the bigger picture, it’s about not missing the little things around us. And returning to those silent, nameless infants above, the best piece of writing I have encountered this week are the words of Matthew 10:29, which in paraphrase I hope reassures us that those lives which are unknowable to us and seemingly worthless, are known and matter to our and their heavenly father.

“Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care.”

## **Village Green Update**

There's been more good news on funding for the village playing field this month, with an award of £2,500 from Oxfordshire's Councillors Priority Fund. Many thanks to our

local councillor Yvonne Constance for her support! We're still keeping our fingers crossed for positive responses from the National Lottery and Sport England.

In the meantime we are applying the Calor Community Fund (which covers areas without mains gas) for money to launch another part of the Village Green project – planting a collection of UK native trees. This will harmonise the Green with the local landscape, help us all learn the names of the trees (some of which I bet will surprise you), attract more birds, insects and wild animals. It will also enable us to set aside a space on the Green for plaques to remember and celebrate local people and events. This commemorative space, as well as being in a sheltered spot amongst the trees, will have seats and sculptures (probably living willow sculptures). Each person who puts up a plaque will be invited to make a donation for future development and upkeep of the Green.

I suggested last month that we should all work together to make the Green clean and safe for children to play on. I did not hear from anyone who disagreed, so I hope that we are all firmly on board in support of this objective. I'm pleased to say that we now have posters designed by children at the school – congratulations to the winners of our competition! - to remind us in case we forget. The Village Green group is still looking into waste disposal options but hasn't made a firm decision yet on the way forward.

## Country Matters

I heard the first chiffchaff on March 20, the same day that the Bishopstone dairy cows went out to grass for the first time. I wake every morning hearing woodpeckers and believe we have more about these days, both greater spotted and green. There are two pairs of Canada geese on our pond at Zulu and walking back a snipe rose from a meadow.

Squirrels are like marmite; they are loved or hated. To foresters they are bad news and they have done much damage to the silver birch in the millennium wood planted by Helen Browning between Bishopstone and Idstone. But they can be fascinating. I once got up very early to discover what culprit was killing young released pheasant poults, and motionless at vigil two inquisitive squirrels came very close to me, making a quiet mewling sound. As a young teenager I was always climbing trees on our farm at Shellingford and yes, in those days collecting birds' eggs was not illegal. One only took one and tried not to disturb the nest. Climbing to this nest I was horrified to find not eggs but a nest of young tree rats with hairless tails.

In the 50's Harold Macmillan was a minister with responsibility for rebuilding the nation's forestry after the war and inaugurated a scheme paying a shilling (5p) a squirrel tail. With my brother we saw squirrels going into a hole in a smallish dead tree. We set fire to the tree and shot six as they emerged with our .410 gun which father had given me after purchasing it from John Betjeman, no less, who then lived at Uffington. These rather gruesome trophies were then packaged and dispatched to the Ministry of Agriculture at Oxford for our reward!

The countryside journalist Robin Page and Prince Charles have both campaigned for our native red squirrels now threatened by greys introduced from North America in the late 19th century and also by squirrel pox, carried by greys but fatal to reds. We have seen them many times in Scotland. Fairly recently we stayed at a farm B&B near Gretna Green where the farmer had a nature trail and was trapping greys to preserve his red squirrel numbers. He was distraught that he had trapped a red that for some reason had expired despite his frequent daily visits. They are protected from 1981 and also flourish on Anglesey and on the Isle of Wight. We were chuffed to view one this February in a park with splendid conifers at Tarbes in south west France.
