

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

On November 17th 1940, Provost Howard stood in the bombed and smouldering ruins of the once beautiful Coventry Cathedral and led the congregation of traumatised citizens in the first service following the destruction of the city. He placed a cross of charred timbers on the altar, and forged a cross of medieval nails from the roof timbers and held it up to the congregation. His first words were repeated throughout the short service.

"Father, Forgive". In the midst of so much death and destruction, he used words that were to inspire reconciliation between the citizens of Coventry, Dresden, Berlin, Hamburg and Hiroshima. The Cross of Nails and those powerful words helped to shape the peace of Europe and the world in the years after 1945. We know that words can be a force for evil as well as a force for good, and as a former teacher I know that social media can be a mixed blessing.

I also remember the late Frank Parkinson giving one of his memorable sermons in Longcot church. Ever the one for memorable imagery, he said, "remember the contents of a tube of toothpaste. Once squeezed out, impossible to get back in again. So choose your words with care."

He cautioned us to remember that what we say, and the way in which we say it, can have a profound effect on all those with whom we interact. He believed that our words should be used as a balm to the distressed in a troubled world, and I know that his wise counsel helped very many people. "Comfort the afflicted, and if necessary, afflict the comfortable!"

My own father's mantra to our family was, "Always try to be slow to chide and swift to bless." I know this can sometimes be a challenge, but worth striving to achieve nevertheless.

It is said that Provost Howard concluded his service on that memorable November day with the following.

"May the power of the words of Christ always guide us in our daily lives and in our pursuit of peace and a better world."

Amen to that.

From the archives

The new road from the Shrivenham Railway Station to the Village of Ashbury, was opened to the public on Saturday last.

Wilts and Gloucester Standard Sat 16th April 1870

BURGLARY. - James Cox, of Wanborough, was brought before Mr. T. L. Goodlake, on Monday, charged with breaking into the dwelling-house of Mrs. Collins, of Ashbury, and stealing therefrom six knives and forks, and other articles. The offence was committed in August, 1865, since which time Cox has been an inmate of Devizes Gaol on another charge, and was apprehended, on leaving that establishment, by Superintendent Johnson. The prosecutrix's son being, however, unable to swear to some of the stolen property, which was produced, the prisoner was discharged.

Country Matters

We hoped for a dry March but that failed. it keeps raining which is holding up work on the farm. I heard the first chiff- chaff on Sunday March 17th and hedges are greening up nearly a month early. However, I will concentrate on deer and squirrels. With DEFRA incentivising the planting of more woodland and hedges as part of environmental policies aimed at cutting carbon, the Government is rightly concerned that these two marauding species will predate and fraught the delivery of this policy.

The imported grey squirrels damage deciduous trees by debarking the leading branch, causing serious stunting. I may have mentioned before that in the 1950's Harold Macmillan was serving in Winston Churchill's cabinet with responsibility for forestry which needed promoting after the war. He arranged for the MAFF (Ministry of Agriculture Fisheries and Food and forerunner of DEFRA) to pay I think a shilling (5p) for each squirrel tail. My brother and I saw two squirrels enter a hole on a dead tree. We set fire to this small tree and managed to shoot six as the smoke forced them out. The tails were boxed up and sent to Oxford! Some call them tree rats but as nut eaters I am prepared to eat squirrel.

Defra's latest policy will aim to promote a squirrel feed additive with gene editing that will mean birth of only one sex to prevent breeding and control of future numbers. The feeders would only be accessible to greys so If successful this policy might allow the native red squirrels to expand from their small existing territories. Their numbers have fallen from 3.5 million to a few hundred thousand.

The escalating numbers in the deer population is obvious in this neck of the woods. Only yesterday I saw twelve fallow bucks, well antlered, down in the vale on our Zulu farm; in these numbers there for the first time. I rang a friend and he shot two enormous beasts that evening. Defra reports that the deer population is the highest for a 1,000 years and fertility control is not possible. Some are advocating the reintroduction of wolves to reduce numbers but they would also take sheep. Culling by rifle remains the only option.

Venison has been called Britain's most sustainable meat but the market needs further incentives to develop, particularly in the south. Government plans to use more venison in hospitals, army barracks and in the prisons and maybe into food banks. Venison needs to be cheaper in the supermarkets. Muntjac are also a problem. They can breed all the year round and they gnaw the bark and kill trees at ground level.
