
Ashbury High Street will be closed for the event, but please follow the Directions of our Traffic Wardens as you travel to and from the event

Wear warm clothes, sturdy shoes, carry a torch and keep little ones close



Country Matters

I am writing this just before Rachel Reeves's budget on Nov 26. The farming community does not expect moderation to her proposed inheritance tax raid aimed at farms and businesses. Her proposals have kept lawyers and accountants busy over the summer trying to find measures that will mitigate the damage. For the elderly who are unlikely to survive seven years the tax will not be found out of income which will force sales. Farming confidences have also been dented by a recent drop in the milk price and lacklustre returns in the arable sector where very smart machinery labours in vain to make a tiny profit or a loss if crops are scorched by drought.

However, one bright sector has been beef prices. Prices to the farmer have risen from £5/ kg dead weight to £6.50 + over the past year and from 2023 when prices were nearer £4/kg. To keep sales buoyant some of these rises have not been passed on to the consumer as the trade usually tries to average out the highs and lows. Even so, the restaurant trade is obliged to price the best steak cuts above £30 for 8 ounces. We have beef cattle grazing marginal land and the best sorts can now come to over £2000 compared with half that figure a few years ago.

Increasingly there is an alternative red meat that can be sourced so much cheaper. Venison and game come into this category. We are now in the season of game shooting. By law game may not be shot on a Sunday. Pheasants may be shot Oct 1st-Feb 1st, and partridges Sept 1st -Feb 1st. Deer, with no predator bar man have never been so numerous. In the south we see fallow, roe and muntjac. There could be 800 fallow in the five square miles round Ashdown Park. We have installed deer fencing to protect our crops. Historically Ashdown was a deer park with ordnance survey maps still recording "park pale", the former boundary ditch and fence. The fallow bucks have these striking palmate antlers with spotted hides before these turn grey/brown over winter. They are alert and cautious and not easy to shoot. Fallow and roe game laws permit shooting does Nov 1st – March 31st with fallow bucks Aug 1st-April 30th and roe bucks April 1st-Oct 31st.

Recently the Royal Oak, Bishopstone featured venison steaks and venison goulash on their menus. The steaks are lean and will match beef steak. Plucking machines make short work of the feathers or game can be easily skinned. Here on our doorstep we have this natural abundance of an almost free organic and unfarmed source of meat that human carnivores should be tucking into for a change at cheaper prices too, especially in comparison with beef.
