

Councillors Corner

The Parish Council held our first meeting of the year on 15 January. There are three items to share with you in this newsletter. We decided our budget. We started the process of looking for new sub-tenants to run the Ashbury Shop and Café. And we agreed to put out a call for volunteers to take the sixth seat on the Council.

On the budget, we were mindful how tough it has been this year for many people to make ends meet. So we set our funding bid for the next financial year at a level just to protect what we can do for the community against inflation. This will mean a small increase of about 13p per month in the average household's contribution.

On the Village Shop, as is now public knowledge, we announced that Lorna Halford had given us notice to surrender her sub-lease. We recorded on behalf of all of you our warm thanks to Lorna for the service she had given to the community through running the shop since 2015, especially during the difficult Covid years when the shop was a life-line for so many in the Parish.

Looking ahead, we have formed a sub-committee headed by James Greenham to take forward the search for new sub-tenants. This will be done through a transparent open tender. As I write there are plans for a **first public meeting (on Thursday 25 January at 1900 in the Village Hall)** to explain the process and the timeline which we will follow. The Council is open to any model for the new sub-tenancy which will deliver a service, whether shop, café or both, which you, the Community, will support through your custom. Do please engage in this discussion and consider how you might help to renew this vital community asset.

Finally, after receiving notice from OCC that they had received no expressions of interest, we are now able ourselves to advertise a **vacancy on the Parish Council**, the sixth seat vacated at the end of last year. Do please consider joining us! We are not looking for anyone with a particular skill set, just for a parish resident wishing to do their bit to serve the community.

Ashbury Community Club:


Thursday, 29th February at 2.30pm

The Oxford Journal- 200 years ago this month

MAIDEN ELM TIMBER.
TO BE SOLD BY AUCTION,
By FIDEL & SON,

On Monday, February 16, 1824, precisely at Twelve o'clock, at the Barrington Arms Inn, Shriyenham, Berks, 83 MAIDEN ELMS, on lands in the occupation of Mr. John Saunders, and Mr. Thos. Wilson, at Chapel-vick and Ashbury, near Shrivenham, Berks, to whom application may be made for viewing the timber. The whole of the trees are felled and divided into convenient lots, lettered and numbered with white paint.

Catalogues will appear in due time, to be procured at the place of sale; and of the auctioneers, Faringdon.

Country Matters

When we bought Lammydown farm in 1991 above Bishopstone it was rolling downland and 330 acres. There was one small copse planted by the Smiths, the previous owners. There were two sites with an open shed and a dutch barn apiece, also unploughable downland of 70 acres. One barn site near the ridgeway soon fell foul to arson. I got seven small woods planted using Wessex forestry of Hungerford, got planning for a house, laid down an access of nearly a mile including a mains electrical supply and sunk a well 220 feet down for water.

Now, twenty-five years later ,the woods have grown and probably want thinning. The arable fields are much the same. The downland has been a source of interest with the wildflowers such as rock rose, milk wort, wild thyme, scabious, harebell, knapweed, restharrow, ragwort which we try to control and the four orchids, fragrant, common, pyramidal and burn tip.

The recent focus has been on measures to join up the woods by planting hedges and secondly to enhance the protective edges round the woods with shrub. Lonicera is box- like but establishes much faster to form a dense barrier if successful. I have tried laurel without much success. Over the years we have planted over three miles of hedge and this winter have now completed a further 700 yards. The species are hawthorn, privet, maple, hazel, spindleberry and dogwood. Deer predation means that the first three years will be critical if this effort is not to be wasted. So both sides will carry electric wire as a deterrent.

Watching the planting progress have been a pair of stonechats. They are pretty with a chestnut breast and black crown and they find a perch on fence posts moving ahead. Fieldfares and redwings are making great inroads into harvesting this year's exceptional crop of haws on the hawthorn bushes.

On my recent annual trip to the north York Moors I spotted a mistle thrush and on one drive many woodcock, also grouse, but our focus was on the very high and challenging pheasants and partridge coming off the tops. It was cold but a very pretty landscape especially so with a good covering of snow glistening in the low sun. Down at Thirsk it had all disappeared.
