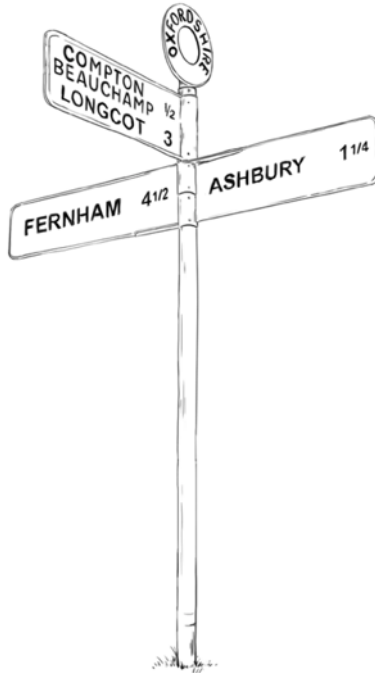

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

“Put not your trust in Princes”

While cogitating about what to write for this section this month, someone helpfully suggested that perhaps I could consider the phrase “Put not your trust in Princes” as they said it seemed very apt considering recent news. I agreed that it seemed a good place to start from so here goes.

I don't feel here is the platform for making political comments about particular people or leaders because I try to avoid contentious distractions which are at the end of the day quite frivolous, divisive or inconsequential. I see the thought for the month as a place to stimulate spiritual thoughts which ultimately may have eternal consequences and although you may or may not agree with my views I would urge you to consider them.

The phrase is quite well known and is taken to mean that you should not put your ultimate trust in any world leader or any human as they cannot actually save you as they all die and their plans die with them. The same fate befalls the next leader who replaces them..... it could be summarised by saying “the dead are replaced by the dying (or the not yet dead!)....repeat...repeat”

What a lot of people do not realise is that the phrase (Like many other wise sayings) is taken from the bible (Psalm 146 v 3). What the chapter goes on to say is that instead of trusting any human we should put our trust in the one true God who is the maker of the whole universe.

Many may know that I love art and collect pictures. When I look at paintings, I'm often struck by how the artist uses the juxtaposition of horizontal and vertical planes to create a picture.

All human/human interaction is on the earthy or horizontal plane and is only temporary and of no lasting consequence. Contrast that with God to human interaction which is on the vertical or spiritual plane and is eternal. It is these contrasts which Psalm 146 uses and he urges Instead of putting our trust in humans who cannot save we should put our trust in God who is the only one who can.

So next time you hear someone say, “put not your trust in princes”, think about the rest of the chapter and consider where your hope and trust lies.

In the News : February 1903

TO THE EDITOR OF THE STANDARD.

SIR,—An unusual phenomenon occurred here on Sunday morning, about nine o'clock. The water caught off the roofs from a storm at that time was of a dirty milky colour; the froth, too, was of a particularly tenacious character, lasting for many hours. I can only suppose that this must have been caused by volcanic dust from the eruptions in the West Indies. There would be no local dust on the roofs, as we had rain on the Saturday.

On inquiry, I find that the occurrence was noticed for several miles round. I have saved a bottle of the water if anyone would like it. The rain drops on the windows left a deposit of dirt on drying off.

Country Matters

Infilling some weak spots in a boundary hedge with new bare root hawthorn plants, a good flock of long tailed tits rose from a nearby bush. I am familiar with a “charm” of goldfinches but I had to look up the collective noun for long tailed tits. They are called a volery or zephyr. They may have 6-12 eggs but with a second brood the young of the first breed can remain together in the same company to form these larger zephyrs. I remember aged about ten finding my first long tailed tit nest. Volery can also apply to wagtails from the Latin to fly).

Collective nouns for birds are often onomatopoeic as in a murder of crows, a parliament of rooks, a mischief of busy magpies associated with the country doggerel “one for a boy two for a girl etc Choughs, as seen on some coastal cliffs or in alpine ski resorts are known as a chattering, owls a wisdom, and I include a picture of three young barn owls taken by me at Zulu farm just before they fledged in July 2011.

Memorably the force of nature of wheeling starlings at dusk is known as a murmuration and larks ascending as portrayed in music by Vaughan Williams are known as an exultation.

Digging my vegetable patch in the frost this morning because that’s when it goes most easily, I was as you might expect, joined soon by a robin. The collective noun for robins is a worm! I have no idea why wrens are a chime and swallows a kettle or linnets a parcel. Linnets commonly also congregate together in winter as flocks of little brown jobs (ljb’s). This is where the phone apps are so valuable in identification.

Perhaps I can understand why house martins are known as a circlage, sparrows a quarrel, snipe a wisp as they peel away showing their white belly and ptarmigan which I have seen in the Alps skiing are understandably known as an invisibleness against the snow.

Jays are a scold with their raucous cry and woodcock a fall, probably because of their flight pattern. Woodpeckers dipping flight is so similar to that of a jay that a friend of mine was so embarrassed to shoot one once by mistake. To remind him to be more careful I bought him a cap sporting a woodpecker motif. Though jays can be predators of birds’ eggs and nestlings some shooting people like them about because jays bury acorns which may in time be oaks.

We once observed Mr and Mrs green woodpecker on our lawn at close quarters searching for ants, their favourite food. It was instructive to observe the different red head marking between the sexes and their noun is a descent, again obviously from their dipping mode of flight like a jay.
